SAM SARPONG Hollywood's Renaissance Man

Sam Sarpong is a modern-day Renaissance Man. Excelling as an Actor, Supermodel, Host, and Rapper—Sam is on the path to becoming one of Hollywood's most sought-after entertainers.

Sam was lunched into the national spotlight as co-host of MTV's Hit show "Yo Momma," (currently in syndication) and has since gone on to serve as the host of the BET Awards preshow "All Access," for the last 5 years. This year, at the 2013 BET Awards, Sam was selected to present the first ever "Best International Artist" category. Continuing to grow within the Network, Sam recently wrapped the much buzzed about BET pilot "Underground Outlet" featuring Sarpong as the main host.



Sam, who has already appeared in over 60 movies and 40 television shows, gained international recognition and acclaim in 2011, starring as Paul Unanga in the award-winning independent film, "Anchor Baby." An official selection screened at the 2011 Cannes Film Festival, Anchor Baby is the winner of the "Best Film and Actress Award" at the 2010 Harlem International Film Festival and was nominated for two African Academy Awards at the 2011 African Movie Academy Awards ceremony.

In 2006 Sam Sarpong made fashion history when he became the first black male model to ever shoot a campaign with one of the worlds premiere luxury brands, Louis Vuitton. A recipient of the prestigious MAA Fashion Award for Male Model of the Year, and twice named "Today's Black Woman," magazine "Fifty Most Beautiful People," Sam Sarpong was added to "Us Weekly's," "Hot 100 Young Hollywood with Style" list. Sam has walked the runway for designers such as Versace, Donna Karen, Gucci, Dolce & Gabbana, Jean Phillppe, and Ed Hardy. Sam has also started his own clothing brand, "Future Stars Collection," a line of high-end T-shirts, jeans, and hoodies.

Sarpong can next be seen this fall co-staring alongside Tiny Lister in the feature film "No Weapons." Sam Sarpong will also co-star with 90210's Matt Cohen in the film "Trigger," and appear on the television series, "Average Dad," with actors Jamie Presley and Brent Goldberg.



Additionally, Sam Sarpong will be featured campaigns for Boy London, and serve as the international face of the Nelson Mandela foundation 46664 clothing line this year. Sarpong will also be featured in Nike's 2013 back to school commercials.

Sam Sarpong is also a member of the Hip-Hop/Pop group *The League*, which has been extremely popular in Asia. Over the last decade the group has released 6 albums that have all achieved certified platinum or double platinum status. Later this year Sarpong will release his solo EP, "Loose My Mind" which is featured on VH1's hit show "Hit The Floor." Sam is also featured on the "Scary Movie 5" soundtrack with his song "Thunder"

Always evolving, Sam Sarpong continues to mold himself into a polymath for all things entertainment.

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am Sarpong was probably the overachieving kid you always secretly envied in high school-the one with the good looks, the charm and the perfect attendance from grades four through 12. Now 26, the London-born former Tommy Hilfiger model continues to add to his list of accomplishments: actor, rapper and owner of a production company. "Everything I've wanted to do, I wanted to be the best," says Sarpong, who not only is the first black male model to land a prestigious Louis Vuitton campaign, but also is one of only three black male models to ever hold an exclusive contract for a major fashion line. Sarpong's talents will be on full display when he launches his own clothing line this summer and in fall when he co-hosts Yo Momma, MTV's new daily comedy show.

When it comes to fashion, do you rock urban or couture style? My style is London, mixed with vintage, mixed with hip-hop. A lot of young cats out here, especially brothers, they wear their pants real baggy. My jeans are more form-fitted that's London right there. For vintage, I'll wear an old-school Members Only leather jacket, and [for] hip-hop, I'll wear a "diamonded-out" watch and I'll rock it with a Future Stars trucker hat.

What do you wear out on the town? When I wear suits, I've always worn just Louis Vuitton and Gucci. I'm really into velvet and velour, so you'll catch me with a nice dress shirt by Gucci and I'll mix it with a Louis Vuitton velour suit.

Do you put a lot of time into selecting your date outfits? Honestly, because I've always been into fashion, I have a knack for it. Of course if you're going to a really dressy event, I've got to put some time in it, [but] it's not something where I really have to sit in the mirror and make sure it matches. Who are your favorite designers? Louis Vuitton, Gucci, Dolce and Gabbana and this company called Girl ExtraOrdinaire, [which] makes a lot of my custom outfits. The thing about me is that I don't like to look like anybody [else] on the red carpet, so I'll buy a vintage leather jacket, takeit to Girl ExtraOrdinaire, they'll customize it, and I'll have a one of a kind piece.

What do you wear to demand attention? I would say any of my custom pieces that have rhinestones or beading because they bring a lot of attention and they have good attwork. It doesn't matter who I'm with on the red carpet, the paparazzi always take a lot of pictures. That shows you that they like my style and my personality.

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SAM SARPONG TESTS HIS LIMITS BY NAME HEMPHILL



asked to follow supermodel Sam Sarpong for a week, my perception of the typical "model turned actor" was the first image projected in my head. Like a movie, I did a quick run through in my mind of what the week would consist of: Girls, partying, insignificant conversations about modeling, fame, designers and other narcissistic impressions. I didn't expect to learn or be inspired by much. Little did I know, not only is Sarpong the complete opposite of the conventional "Hollywood star" but has a spirit that eliminates all past perceptions and stereotypes of the life of entertainers. I meet with Sam that following week in Pasadena at a small cozy coffee shop around 8 AM. To my surprise, Sam was very laid back and casual. He was attentive, funny and intrigued about my line of work. From there we went to the set of his film "Crossed The Line", co-starring Ice T and Vanessa Williams. During his set breaks he took the opportunity to discuss with me his dreams and aspirations for his upcoming projects like "The Life of an Entertainer", "The House that Jack Built" and his pilot "Glass Heel". Sam's album, "The Life of an Entertainer", includes collaborations with Kristinia Debarge, Brutha, Coolio, Floerty and Drew Sidora. During his lunch break we listened to his first single "On 1" which is to be released at the end of this month. Around 11 AM we headed over to Lorabee Studios to follow up on soundtracks Sam is a part of. There I meet one of Sam's group members, Key, who also helped co-write songs for the album.

On Tuesday I met up with Sam and Key at a fitting for a red carpet event party for designer Amal Guessous. Guessous designed Michael Jackson's last tour jacket before his death, and now he is designing custom pieces dedicated to Sam's tour which starts this month. From there we headed back to the studio. After hours of music, jokes and singing Sam was ready to hit the red carpet. As soon as Sam and his entourage walked into the event, paparazzi and women migrated towards the area. 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calm and collected. He didn't let any of the attention or limelight swallow up who he really is. As he walked me to my car after the event, he expressed his passion for philanthropy work. After doing Boys & Girls Club tours, Sam proclaims that his heart lies in the youth and community. Wednesday had to be the busiest day for Sam, and even busier because I was at his foot-and-tail asking tons of questions. Although hectic, Sarpong has a way of remaining cool and mellow. After I followed him back to the set of "Crossed the Line" his best friend Brian who told me stories of him and Sam when they were younger, and how Sam was a very good friend to him in his time of need entertained me. After hours on set we hurried to the Warner Brothers studios for Sam's reoccurring role in the hit show "Cold Case".

It was amazing how he switched characters so effortlessly. One minute he was an illuminating rap star named Zed, the next he was simple Sam again. Because of his personality and humbling confidence I would have never guessed he has appeared in over 60 films all around the world. From being named one of the Most Beautiful People in the World in 2005 by "YM" magazine and titled one of the Hot 100 Young Hollywood Stars in "US Weekly". Sarpong never conveys any level of arrogance or intimidation. During his set break he introduced me to his co-star Kathryn Morris who showed us pictures on her iPhone of a baby doing the "B boy stance". Sam provided such a comfortable setting for everyone that I forgot we had just met two days ago. We wrapped up for "Cold Case" around 11 PM then we headed over to a radio station to promote his upcoming movie "Farmhouse" with co-star Drew Sadora. "Farmhouse", Sam details, "is psychological thriller set in the modern day mid-west that trailers two couples who leave their old lives behind in order to start a new one. Instead, they are bombarded with past secrets and malicious acts
